Is Vegas Still a Cup Threat?

Vegas has had a remarkable run since becoming the NHL's 31st franchise. With two Stanley Cup appearances in only seven seasons including a banner from the 2022-23 season, most teams would kill for the success of the Golden Knights. The team has been so successful that last year's first round exit felt like a major disappointment. The Dallas Stars ultimately got the best of the Golden Knights in a wild seven game series in which the road team won the majority of the games. Vegas again has their sights set on the cup, but they'll have to overcome some extremely deep and talented teams in the Pacific if they want to reach their goals.

Forwards

When healthy, **Jack Eichel** is as dangerous a player as there is in the National Hockey League. Still just 27, Eichel posted 68 points in 63 games including 31 goals, and he kept that pace rolling in the playoff series against Dallas (3 goals, 4 assists). He hasn't topped 70 games in a season since 2018-19, but if he can string a healthy season together this year, he's a legitimate Hart Trophy (MVP) candidate. The Golden Knights will be counting on his play more than ever with an injury to **William Karlsson**. One of the few remaining original Golden Knights, Karlsson spent several years chasing his career best season (2017-18) when he led the NHL in plus-minus and tallied 43 goals and 78 points. He finally found that form last year, scoring 30 goals and 30 assists in 70 games. However, Karlsson finds himself on the IL to begin the season, leaving a gap at center in his absence. The top point man from last year's time, Jonathan Marchessault, is now a Nashville Predator which leaves another big hole on offense. **Mark Stone** will do his best Marchessault impression, but the 32 year old played just 56 games last year and hasn't produced a season of more than 60 points since 2020-21, although he accomplished that feat in just 55 games. It's also worth noting that the injury that kept him out of the lineup was a freak injury to his spleen, so hopefully he'll be a bit more lucky in 2024-25.

The emergence of a capable second line should help the Golden Knights improve a somewhat average offense last season. **Pavel Dorofeyev** scored 13 goals in only 47 games last season. If he can score at that pace over a sample size of closer to 82 games, Vegas will get a big lift. **Tomas Hertl** and **Alexander Holtz** will fill into important roles as the Golden Knights must also replace Chandler Stephenson and Michael Amadio. Ertl has missed 110 games in just the last two seasons, but he's only a couple of years removed from back-to-back 60 point seasons with San Jose.

Defense/Goaltending

While the offense looks quite a bit different from last year, the defense remains mostly in tact. Golden Knights fans will be familiar with the names of the D-men, especially with the top line of **Shea Theodore** and **Alex Pietrangelo**, both of whom were critical in the title run two years ago. Pietrangelo is fearless, blocking nearly two shots a game last season. **Noah Hanifin** wasn't on the Golden Knights long last season after being traded at the deadline from Calgary, but he quickly made an impact on the offensive end with 17 points and he's also a key piece on a power play unit that could use some refining. Vegas will continue to run their zone defense under head coach Bruce Cassidy and with the returning talent, could be a top ten defense after just missing out on that ranking last season.

Last year, Logan Thompson and **Adin Hill** split time between the pipes. Statically, the two net minders were nearly identical and now that Thompson has moved on to Washington, Hill assumes the starting role. He was sharp in the three postseason games he played. In addition to Hill, Vegas brings in **Ilya Samsonov** from Toronto. His numbers were far from impressive last season especially considering he played on a quality team in the Toronto Maple Leafs, but the change in scenery could be exactly what he needs to return to the quality form he displayed two seasons ago, complete with a 2.33 GAA and .919 save percentage in 40 starts.

The Bottom Line

It's difficult to be the main attraction in Las Vegas, but the Golden Knights have managed to get plenty of attention with their quality play and they have a dedicated fan following. Those fans have become spoiled with all of the success. At least, that's the view of the other jealous 31 franchises. However, expectations are perhaps a little lower than usual with some major concerns heading into this season. Will those issues prevent Vegas from reaching the playoffs? Perhaps not, but expecting the Golden Knights to actually contend for the cup might be too optimistic. Can the team really afford to lose Karlsson for an extended period of time, and will there be enough offense to replace the departure of Marchessault and others?
